FALL FOLIAGE

Take time to celebrate National Fall Foliage Week by enjoying the beautiful Autumn leaves and focusing on these facts about the change in the season.

- Toward the end of September, leaves of brilliant green begin to change toward vibrant red, orange, gold, and yellow hues. The leaves are green because of photosynthesis. From Spring through Summer, the leaves are constantly creating chlorophyll, a pigment found in the chloroplasts of plants that allows the plant to absorb energy from sunlight and turn it into glucose, which then feeds the plant. Millions of chlorophyll cells inundate the leaves, making them appear green.
- The word chlorophyll is derived from two Greek words, "khloros," meaning "pale green," and "phyllon," which translates "leaf."
- Other compounds besides chlorophyll are present in the leaves. Carotenoids such as beta-carotene are present, containing yellow and orange pigments, while anthocyanins provide a vivid red color to leaves, and flavonols bringing a yellow the color of egg yolks. But throughout the Spring and Summer, these are masked by the huge amounts of the green pigment. Without the vast amount of chlorophyll, the golds, reds, oranges, yellows, and browns would be seen year round.
- As the days of Autumn grow short with less and less sunshine, the production of chlorophyll winds down and the true color of the leaves makes its presence known.

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• Farther south, the Blue Ridge and Great Smoky Mountains provide a lengthy season due to their many high peaks. Color begins at 6,000 feet and above during the last week of September, with the transformation beginning at 5,000 feet in elevation the first week of October, then the second week at 4,000 to 5,000 feet.

CHESS

National Chess Day is coming up on October 13 and Tidbits invites you to “check” out these facts we’ve discovered on this challenging game, a game played by about 600 million people worldwide.

• Most historians concur that the game of chess has its origins in India in the 6th century. The Indian strategy game of chaturanga is believed to be the ancestor of chess. Chaturanga featured game pieces of King, General, Chariot, Elephant, Horse, and foot-soldier. The game had migrated to southern Europe by the 9th century. Chess became extremely popular in Spain by the 15th century, but the pieces were somewhat changed, with our modern-day pieces reflecting those changes. The General became the Queen, the Chariot changed to the Rook, and the Elephant was modified to the Bishop. The Ashva, or horse, became the Knight of today, and the foot-soldiers changed to pawns.

• The modern chess board was developed in Europe in 1090. There are 64 squares, with the rows on the board called ranks and the columns referred to as files.

• The folding chess board came about in an unusual way. In 1125, a priest who enjoyed playing the game was forbidden by the Church to play. He secretly developed a board that looked like two books lying together so it could be camouflaged on his bookshelf.

• The object of chess is to “checkmate” the King, meaning that when the King is in “check” by a piece, he cannot block it, move to another square, or capture that piece. The word “checkmate” has its origins in the Persian language, with “shah mat” translating “the King is helpless.”

• Each player starts the game with 16 pieces – one King, one Queen, two rooks, two knights, two bishops, and eight pawns. The King can move one square in any direction, the

Badly Behaved Dogs Need Basic Commands

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: Every time I read an article about a badly behaved dog, the trainer says that the dog needs to relearn basic commands like sit, stay and lie down. Why would unrelated commands solve a behavior problem?

— Edward in Albany, New York

DEAR EDWARD: Every dog should be trained to respond to five basic commands: come, heel, sit, stay and lie down. Dogs need to obey their owner the first time and every time a command is issued.

That may sound a little harsh, but a dog that can't be controlled is a dog in danger.

Owners need to be able to recall a dog that has slipped its leash before it runs into traffic. They need to make sure their dog will walk beside them and will sit calmly on command, especially when another dog approaches. Their dog needs to stay in position when told to do so -- whether sitting or lying down.

Dogs aren't robots, though. Like us, their discipline and training will slip if not regularly reinforced. Think about how often you and I give in to temptation and take that second cookie (or third or fourth or fifth). Just as we humans sometimes need reinforcement of good habits, our dogs need regular reinforcement of basic commands.


When owners spend more time working one-on-one with their dogs, they frequently report that undesirable behaviors happen less often. The time and attention that owners give can quickly blunt attention-seeking behaviors.

Energetic young dogs can be a handful sometimes. If you are having trouble getting your dog to respond to basic commands, enlist the help of a professional trainer.

• Depending on the species, oak trees typically produce bronze, copper, or brown leaves as the chlorophyll supply is depleted. The chestnut oak will turn brown and yellow, while California's valley oak will turn bronze and gold.

• Weather plays a large factor in the changes in colors. Water supply, the amount of light, and temperatures all influence how long the change takes. Lower temperatures, but still above freezing, promote the accumulation of anthocyanins, which will bring the intense reds found in maple trees. However, if there's an early frost, the intensity of the color will be diminished. A bright, dry day is best for appreciating the Fall colors.

• As the leaves are changing color, another process is taking place – the colorful leaves begin falling. This is the tree's defense mechanism to protect itself against harsh winter temperatures. The tree begins to slowly seal off the veins that carry water and nutrients to the leaves. A layer of new cells develops at the base of the leaf, closing the membranes, preventing water and nutrients from flowing to the leaf. The leaf dies at the stem and falls to the ground. Without the shedding of leaves, the tree's soft vegetation would freeze during the cold winter temperatures, likely killing the tree.

• The fallen leaves serve another purpose as they break down. They create a rich loam on the forest floor that absorbs moisture and functions as a source of nutrients and water for the tree.

• The northeast United States is famous for its vibrant fall foliage. It typically begins in mid-September in Vermont and New Hampshire, moving south over the next two months. The last two weeks of October are prime season for color in Rhode Island.

- Chess is now recognized by the International Olympic Committee as an official sport, making its players subject to drug testing. During tournament play, a player can be declared the loser immediately if his or her cell phone rings during the game.

- How about the world's most expensive chess set? The Jewel Royale chess set is valued at \$9.8 million, with the King alone weighing 5.83 oz. (165.2 g) of 18-carat gold, encrusted with 73 rubies and 146 diamonds. Other pieces are adorned with black pearls, emeralds, rubies, sapphires, diamonds, and platinum. The Art of War chess set is a distant second at \$750,000, with solid gold pieces decorated with rubies, emeralds, sapphires, and diamonds that rest on an ebony board studded with gems.

- Considered by many to be the greatest chess player of all time, Russian grandmaster Garry Kasparov was ranked as the World's No. 1 for 225 out of 228 months. Born in the Soviet Union in 1963, at age 10 he began training at a noted chess school, and was the Soviet junior champion at age 13. At age 22, Kasparov became the youngest World Chess Champion of all time. He retired from competitive chess in 2005 at age 42 and became an author, political activist, and chess coach.

- Psychologists tout chess as effective in treating many disorders. It's recommended to combat Alzheimer's Disease because of its memory-improving properties, as well as stimulating the mind to solve complex problems. Chess has been shown to have a positive effect on those with ADD/ADHD, autism, Asperger's, and schizophrenia.

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- The oldest chess artifacts unearthed by archaeologists were found in Uzbekistan. The ivory pieces date back to at least 760 A.D.

MOVIE FAVORITES: LOVE STORY

"What can you say about a twenty-five-year-old girl who died?" You can say this was the opening line of the blockbuster "Love Story," starring Ryan O'Neal and Ali MacGraw. Follow along as Tidbits offers up the facts on this 1970 tearjerker.

- The film was the story of upper-class Oliver Barrett IV, an ice hockey-playing law student at Harvard who meets Jennifer Cavillieri, a working-class young woman attending Radcliffe College as a student of classical music. Although Jenny desired to study in Paris, she accepted Oliver's marriage proposal and traveled to the Barrett family mansion to meet the parents. Unimpressed with Jenny, Oliver's father privately told the young law student that if he married Jenny, he would be cut off financially.

- True love triumphed and the pair married, with Jenny working as a teacher to help pay for Oliver's law school studies. After his graduation third in his class, he took a job at a reputable New York City firm. A terminal illness discovered during fertility tests takes the life of Jenny in one of the world's most tragic endings.

- "Love Story" started out as a screenplay which writer Erich Segal sold to Paramount Pictures. However, while the film was in production, the studio asked Segal to write a novel from the screenplay to be published before the release of the film in order to boost publicity. It took Segal a month to adapt it into the novel, which quickly became a bestseller, and was the nation's top-selling work of fiction that year.

- Although the relatively-unknown Ali MacGraw was first choice for the role of Jenny, several actors turned down the role of Oliver, including Jon Voight, Peter Fonda, Michael York, Jeff Bridges, and Michael Douglas, before it was offered to TV actor Ryan O'Neal. MacGraw received \$20,000 for the movie, while O'Neal was paid \$25,000.

- "Love Story" marked the first film role of Tommy Lee Jones, who had a small role as a Harvard student.

- O'Neal had to learn to ice skate to play the role of a hockey player and MacGraw took lessons for her scene playing the harpsichord.

- The filming of "Love Story" on the Harvard campus led the university to prohibit the filming of all future movies there. There were reports of disruptions to students and damage to vegetation, including the fake snow killing several trees. The cast and crew got the boot after only one week of filming, with other campus scenes shot at nearby schools.

- The movie's most famous line "Love means never having to say you're sorry" is ranked as the #13 movie quote of all time by the American Film Institute. The script actually read "Love means not ever having to say you're sorry," but was misspoken in the film. In a 2016 interview, MacGraw was asked if she agreed with the sentiment, to which she replied, "I think it's the opposite. If you've done something frightful to someone you love, you don't just say you're sorry; you change your behavior."

- "Love Story" was 1970's #1 box office hit, and one of the first movies to top \$100 million. Even today, adjusted for inflation, it remains one of the top 40 domestic grosses. It was nominated for 7 Oscars, including Best Picture and Best Director and nominations for both O'Neal and MacGraw, but took home only one for Best Original Score.

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

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Hemorrhagic Disease Confirmed in Deer Across South Dakota

South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks has documented deer mortalities in 2020 due to hemorrhagic disease, also known as epizootic hemorrhagic disease (EHD) or blue tongue. EHD has been confirmed by laboratory analysis in deer from Butte, Davison, Hughes, Meade and Sully counties. Additional reports of dead deer are coming in from other areas as well, many of which likely succumbed to EHD.

This disease is common in white-tailed deer and is typically detected in late summer or early fall. Minor deer losses to EHD can occur in any given year in South Dakota, but weather and habitat conditions will dictate the severity of the disease. EHD is not infectious to humans. For more information on the EHD virus visit <https://gfp.sd.gov/epizootic-hemorrhagic-disease/>.

The virus is spread by a biting midge and causes extensive internal hemorrhaging in infected animals. Many deer exhibit no clinical signs and appear perfectly healthy, while others may have symptoms such as respiratory distress, fever, and swelling of the tongue. With highly lethal strains of the virus, deer can be dead within 1-3 days. Affected deer are often found near low lying areas or water, likely due to the deer attempting to combat the high fever.

“With hunters now out in the field and landowner’s surveillance of wildlife on their properties, we ask those that encounter dead deer to report those to their local conservation officer or GFP office”, said Chad Switzer, wildlife program administrator. “This information will assist wildlife managers in making recommendations to respond accordingly”.

EHD outbreaks can be locally severe, but rarely affect a high proportion of the deer population in a management unit. In 2016, the disease affected deer populations in certain areas of eastern South Dakota and license adjustments were made in some management units to react to these unforeseen mortality events. Deer can continue to succumb to this disease until a hard freeze reduces the midge populations that carry the disease.

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VETERANS POST **New Scheduling Tool**

Struggling to get a medical appointment will be a thing of the past once the Department of Veterans Affairs rolls out its Centralized Scheduling Solution (CSS).

Remember when trying to make an appointment involved talking to a clerk who might need to jerry rig an appointment and write it down in a notebook as a reminder to put it on the schedule later? Remember when scheduling personnel were given performance bonuses for the number of appointments made for the date the veterans wanted them ... while other appointment requests disappeared into the desk? Or the spreadsheets that showed certain areas of the country with extremely high percentages of veterans not getting an appointment within 30 days? Too many of us ended up with no appointment, or appointments that weren't on the date (or even in the month) we requested.

More modern methods and schedulers are using computers, but it has involved them making entries into multiple areas of the program. If you need to get an X-ray and see a doctor, that involves juggling times and availability for an X-ray slot, the equipment, a doctor's schedule and even a room to see him in. The schedulers struggle, they say, going from section to section to find all the matching parts of an appointment.

With the new CSS software program, schedulers will see color-coded sections on the screen with available slots clearly noted. One click and all the necessary parts and pieces of an appointment will fall into place and the appointment will be scheduled.


At this point, only one VA location (in Ohio) is set up with CSS, but more are coming.

The CSS software is part of the Electronic Health Record Modernization program, which electronically tracks all of a veteran's health records. Started in 2018, it will take 10 years to be fully up and running, but CSS is a good partial step.

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

Give Mayonnaise That Personal Touch

I spend hours every day thinking about food. I'm the director of a non-profit health outreach organization and a certified health worker tasked with sourcing and distributing food and essential supplies to underserved neighborhoods impacted by COVID-19. I'm also a chef, healthy food product developer, food writer and cookbook author with a passion for using unique ingredients — produce, meats, herbs and spices — to create recipes as the focus of my work to use food as medicine.

Sometimes, all those hours concentrating on food become a problem when it comes to figuring out what I want to eat. When that happens, I turn to a simple, satisfying solution — I make myself a sandwich. It's the perfect, versatile, hand-held meal for any time of the day!

Sandwiches range from slices of beef, turkey, chicken or seafood on whole-wheat bread to roasted vegetables stuffed in a pita. Dressings, spreads and sauces can add a delicious depth and complexity to a typical sandwich and completely change its flavor profile.

A mealtime sandwich suddenly becomes more interesting with the addition of a beautifully flavored mayonnaise. Adding herbs, spices or fruit to homemade or a good-quality store-bought mayonnaise changes the flavor and can be made to complement a wide range of meats, seafood and vegetables.

Mayonnaise is made by creating an emulsion, in this case oil and egg yolks, two ingredients that normally

don't combine. Egg yolks provide a rich, creamy base, while adding lemon juice or vinegar to the mayonnaise emulsion also helps deter any bacteria growth. Using the highest quality eggs ensures that safety concerns are reduced to a minimum.

All the ingredients for making mayonnaise, especially the eggs, need to be at room temperature. Take everything out at least 30 minutes before you begin. The lecithin in the egg yolks also helps to stabilize the emulsion ingredients, and lutein adds an important antioxidant that helps to maintain healthy vision.

The key to making an emulsion is adding the oil in a slow, steady stream. The type of oil used in the emulsion changes the flavor of the mayonnaise.

3 teaspoons lemon juice or white-wine vinegar

2 teaspoons hot water

- Using a food processor, blender or mixer set on medium speed, combine the egg yolk, salt, dry mustard and sugar until well-blended and a pale yellow.
- With the motor running, slowly drizzle the oils (1/4 cup at a time) into the yolk mixture in a slow, steady stream. Drizzle in 1 tablespoon of the lemon juice and a teaspoon of the hot water. Continue to alternate mixing in the oil and the lemon juice until all the ingredients have been combined. The finished mayonnaise will be thick. If a thinner consistency is desired, whisk in 1 or 2 teaspoons of hot water.
- Cover and refrigerate for at least an hour before using to let the flavors blend. The mayonnaise will keep about 4 to 5 days. Yield: 1 1/4 cups.

The following additions add a unique flavor to this basic mayonnaise recipe:

Spices: saffron, paprika, cumin, mustard, coriander, chilies, horseradish/wasabi, ground ginger, curry powder and nutmeg.

Herbal Flavors: dill, parsley, basil, oregano, sage, cilantro, chives, chervil.

Other Flavors: grated lemon or orange zest, chutney, sun-dried tomatoes, capers, anchovy paste, pureed avocado, roasted red peppers, lime juice, ground dried wild mushrooms, pesto sauce, barbeque sauce, hot sauce, pureed mango or crushed pineapple, soy or Worcestershire sauce, honey mustard, minced garlic, purple or green onions, olives, diced sweet or dill pickles.

Oil Substitutions: Infused olive oils, sweet almond oil, canola oil, safflower oil, avocado oil.

Do not use unrefined oils containing monoglycerides or extra-virgin olive oil, as the flavor is too strong, and the emulsion will separate. For best results, use regular olive oil, or combine it with vegetable oil.

Use this basic recipe for mayonnaise, and then add your favorite combination of herbs, spices and other ingredients to create a spread that will add a special zip to your sandwiches.

BASIC MAYONNAISE

For best results, avoid making mayonnaise during wet or humid weather, as it will affect the emulsion and the mayonnaise will have a greasy texture. For a richer mayo, use only the egg yolks.

- 1 egg yolk
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1/4 teaspoon sugar
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 1/2 cup olive oil

Peanut Butter Apple Crumb Pie

When you add peanut butter and apples, you're doing Magical Meal Math! Don't be tardy -- stir this up today, and you'll be sure to go to the head of the class for desserts.

3 cups (6 small) cored, peeled and sliced cooking apples
1 (6-ounce) purchased graham-cracker pie crust
1 (4-serving) package sugar-free vanilla cook-and-serve pudding mix
1 1/2 cups water
6 tablespoons reduced-fat peanut butter
6 tablespoons purchased graham cracker crumbs or 6 (2 1/2-inch) graham crackers, made into fine crumbs

1. Heat oven to 350 F. Evenly arrange apple slices in pie crust.

2. In a medium saucepan, combine dry pudding mix and water. Add 1/4 cup peanut butter. Mix well to combine. Cook over medium heat until mixture thickens and starts to boil, stirring constantly. Evenly spoon hot pudding mixture over apples.

3. In a medium bowl, combine graham-cracker crumbs and remaining 2 tablespoons peanut butter until mixture is crumbly. Evenly sprinkle crumb mixture over top of pie. Bake for 40 to 45 minutes. Place pie plate on a wire rack and let set for at least 30 minutes. Makes 8 servings.

1 bag (16-ounce) sauerkraut, drained and rinsed
4 ounces sliced Swiss cheese
1 tablespoon margarine or butter

Quick Cucumber Pickles:
1 pound (3 large) Kirby cucumbers
1 tablespoon cider vinegar
1/4 teaspoon salt

1. Prepare Reubens: In cup, combine horseradish, mustard and mayonnaise; spread evenly on 1 side of bread slices.

Top each with one-fourth of corned beef, sauerkraut and Swiss cheese.

2. In nonstick 12-inch skillet, melt margarine over medium-low heat. Arrange sandwiches in skillet. Cover skillet and cook 8 minutes or until cheese melts and bottoms of bread brown.

3. While Reubens are cooking, prepare Quick Cucumber Pickles: Slice unpeeled cucumbers into 1/4-inch-thick slices. In small bowl, toss cucumbers with vinegar and salt. Makes about 3 1/2 cups.

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Cologuard Test Worth Risk of False Positive



DEAR DR. ROACH: I am a 77-year-old man in good health. At my recent annual physical exam, my physician ordered a Cologuard kit to be sent to me to screen for colorectal disease. I have never had symptoms of disease or problems with any part of my gastrointestinal tract. I had two colonoscopies at different times several years ago, the results of which were negative. When I got the kit, I read the patient guidelines and learned that the Cologuard test could result in false positives and that there is an unspecified increase in the risk of false positives for persons over the age of 75.

A positive result from the test requires a follow-up colonoscopy, which is also riskier for elderly patients. Since I am in good health with no symptoms of any disease, I decided I did not want to risk a false positive result from the test, which would require a follow-up colonoscopy. Did I make the right decision? -- E.G.

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ANSWER: Cologuard is a brand of test that looks at DNA in stool for evidence of cancer. Certain DNA mutations are highly suggestive of cancer. In addition, Cologuard does an immunochemical test looking for blood. Because it combines these two techniques, Cologuard is more sensitive than only a test looking for blood. Compared with colonoscopy, Cologuard is about 92% sensitive in finding cancers, meaning it will miss about 8%.

With improved sensitivity comes a lack of specificity, which means you could have a false positive result. The Cologuard can say that you have an abnormality when a colonoscopy would indicate normal. For 45% of people with a positive Cologuard test, no abnormalities will be found upon colonoscopy. You are right that false positives are more prevalent in older individuals.

There are two reasons that I think the Cologuard is still a reasonable choice, despite the fact that it isn't as good as colonoscopy. The first is that I continue to recommend a screening test for healthy 77-year-old men, and although colonoscopy is my first choice, a normal Cologuard test prevents a need for colonoscopy, and a false positive would lead to the same colonoscopy you would have gotten anyway (although there probably is more anxiety after a false positive test).

The second is that a person with an abnormal Cologuard and a normal colonoscopy may be at risk for an abnormality that wasn't found on colonoscopy. A study looking at people in this category found a 25% risk of abnormality on follow-up colonoscopy, if the Cologuard was abnormal again one to two years later.

Art Deco Figurine

There have been many ceramic companies owned by members of the Goldscheider family, which can confuse today's collectors. Friedrich Goldscheider moved from Pilsen, Bohemia, to Vienna in 1885. He started the Goldscheider Porcelain Manufactory and Majolica Factory, a company to make ceramics. He hired famous artists including Michael Powolny, Demetre Chiparus and Josef Lorenzl, and the company soon had an international reputation for excellent figurines and other art deco pieces. Friedrich's sons, Walter and Marcell, joined the company and the business became worldwide in the 1920s and '30s.



This art deco figurine, 11 inches high and marked by Joseph Lorenzl and the Goldscheider company, sold at an Aspire auction for \$1,239 even though there was a small chip on the woman's shoulder.

But Hitler's rules led to the family fleeing to England in 1938; their company was given to others but was no longer successful. Marcell started a Goldscheider factory in Staffordshire.

Walter had a successful company, Goldscheider-U.S.A., in Trenton, New Jersey, after 1940, but he returned to Vienna in 1950 to revive their old company. He closed it

after three years and sold worldwide use of the Goldscheider name to Carstens, a German company. They used it until 1963. About 1988, Peter Goldscheider made a small number of pieces in Austria. Recently, a major book about the Goldscheider family and their ceramics was published with more history, details, artists' names, marks and pictures. The added publicity will probably encourage higher auction prices.

Q: I have a chair that looks like it is made of long, curved horns. When and where were these used?

A: You have a very American chair. Chairs made of buffalo, elk or Texas longhorn steer horns were made from horns left behind at slaughterhouses or discarded by hunters. The horns had a graceful curved shape and when positioned carefully, they created a chair frame with a curved back, legs and arms. An upholstered seat was added and, in some cases, some trim from other pieces of horn. Matching footstools also were made. The chairs

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were not made for comfort, but were popular with hunters and those who wanted memories of the old West. There are pictures that show President Teddy Roosevelt and President Abraham Lincoln both had horn chairs that were gifts. Your chair could bring \$1,000 or more at auction.
